RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTICIPANTS

Dear student,

When participating in a BEST external event participants are expected to enjoy it to the maximum, but to do it in a civilized manner, respecting others and the organisers. Below you can find a list of responsibilities you must acknowledge and comply with, before being able to proceed to the application part.

Article 1) Participants have to pay the deposit to the sending Local BEST Group.

Article 2) During the event, participants have to behave in a civilized manner, respecting people independently of their nationality or beliefs and in accordance with the laws of the country where the event is being held.

Article 3) Participants must provide the host Local BEST Group with the information of arrival at the location specified on the website of the event at least one week before Arrival Day.

Article 4) Participants must arrive at the location specified on the website of the Event at the latest on Arrival Day at the time specified on the event's website, and depart from the event the soonest on Departure Day at the time specified on the event's website.

Article 5) In events with an academic component, participants have to attend all the academic part of the event. Participants have to be on time at the start of all academic sessions.

Article 6) Participants have to attend all activities, take active part in them and may not leave the group unless agreed upon with the organisers.

Article 7) During the event, participants have to pay the event fee specified on BEST public website, according to the country category of their sending Local BEST Group.

Article 8) Participants may not consume alcohol nor be visibly intoxicated during academic activities and other activities defined by the organisers in advance.

Article 9) Unless medical reasons apply, participants may not consume or be visibly under the effects of drugs during academic activities and other activities defined by the organisers in advance.

Article 10) Participants may not sleep during academic activities and other activities defined by the organisers in advance.

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Article 11) A participant will have to pay for any damaged property, if the damage was caused by himself/herself.

Article 12) Participants have the responsibility to evaluate the event in BEST Application System after their attendance. This must be done before the correspondent deadline specified on BEST Application System.

ABOUT THE SUMMER COURSE

You have been chosen to participate in the BEST summer course in Copenhagen, Denmark. During the course you will stay in a cabin in Nærum north of Copenhagen, and have lectures at the Technical University of Denmark in Lyngby close to the cabin.

The course will be facilitated by two main organizers, about 10 organizers, and furthermore four coorganizers from other local BEST groups in Europe.

The academic part of the course will be held on the 21st -25th of July and 28th of July – 1st of August. In the weekend there will be no lectures. The academic part will be held on the lecture days from 9.00 to 16.00 with 1 hour lunch break from 12-13. Furthermore several coffee breaks will take place during the day, where refreshments will be provided. The day will consist of project work by the professor and project work by the students.

For the project work you will have to work in groups of 4-5 persons. These groups will be formed on the arrival. You will have to work with provided teaching material. It is not necessary for you to bring your laptop for the project work, but it you can't live without it, you can of course bring ©

Furthermore a company visit to Microsoft Development Center Copenhagen will be made.

All food will be provided by BEST Copenhagen, meaning you won't have to cook anything, except at international evening (see below). If you are vegetarian and/or allergic to any food, remember to contact the organizers about it.

BEST Copenhagen will provide the transportation to university from the cabin, and back. You should bring money for all extra stuff you want, for example sightseeing.

Several parties will be held during the course, where beer will be sold. You should remember to bring money for beer.

When you arrive at the course you will have to pay a fee of € 45 or lower. The exact fee is given by the country of origin of your LBG. See below for your fee:

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USEFUL INFO ABOUT DENMARK

Population: 5.6 million people

Cities we will visit: Lyngby,

Copenhagen.

Larger cities of interest: Aarhus,

Aalborg and Odense.

Language: Danish. But most people speak very good English. A lot of people speak either of the following or a mix: German, Spanish or French.

Time: CET (GMT+1). Danish people are considered extremely punctual, which can often be a bit annoying for foreigners to get used to. If we arrange a time to meet, then it's not 5-10 minutes after, but precisely at that time. So Spanish / Italian / Portuguese people ... prepare yourself

Money: Denmark is part of the EU, but is not part of the EURO-project. Therefore Denmark still has Danish kroner DKK as its national currency. Some shops (especially tourist shops) accept euro, but you cannot rely on it.

1 euro is approximately 7.5 DKK.

Prices of random things:

Bottle of expensive beer (0.33L) in a bar: 30 DKK / ~4 euro


Bottle of cheapest beer (0.33L) in a supermarket: 3.5 DKK / 0.5 euro

Sandwich at the student cantina: 22 DKK / ~3 euro

Bottle of Coca-Cola (1.5L) in a supermarket: 20 DKK / ~3 euro

McDonalds Big Mac menu: 50 DKK / ~7 euro

Pack of cigarettes: 32 DKK / 4.3 euro



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Electricity: like most of Europe, Denmark has 230 voltage @ 50 Hz power plugs. Below are some images of the sockets:



(The right-most sockets is a special socket for IT equipment, but any of the other plugs can also be used for IT equipment.)

Weather: The weather can change from rain to sunshine in a matter of minutes. The Danish summer weather is known for either being really nice, or with a lot of rain. So prepare for rain, and bring a raincoat or a water repellent jacket. You can check the weather forecast before you leave for Denmark, here: http://www.dmi.dk/eng/index/forecasts.htm

Food & drinks: You will no doubt get to taste some Danish food while you're here, and some from all the other countries represented at the course ;) Danish food typically consists of pork, cow or chicken meat with either potatoes or rice.

Danish people normally eat breakfast in the early hours of the morning (6:00 - 9:00), lunch at 12:00-12:30 and dinner at 18:00-19:00.

The water in Denmark is generally very clean, and Danes drink the water directly from the tap.

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Denmark is among other things known for its Carlsberg beer. And in general beer is very popular among all ages in Denmark. There are many small breweries that make excellent beer. There are also a few wine peasants making wine, but it is not as common.

Laws about alcohol: In Denmark you can walk around in public, with a beer in your hand, without getting arrested. And in the summer time, a lot of young people go to parks or anywhere outside to socialize with a few beers. The strange thing is, Denmark actually has a law forbidding consumption of alcohol in public places, but it is not enforced by the police.



GETTING AROUND IN DENMARK

S-TRAIN:

For travelling between the cities close to Copenhagen, you can use either trains or busses. Below is a map for the train lines ("S-Tog" in Danish). Copenhagen's central station is called: "København H". Stations for the below lines are marked with the sign you see to the right. You have to buy a ticket depending on how many zones (grey separation lines) you cross into. If in doubt, you can always ask people for help. A ticket is valid for a certain period, depending on how many zones it covers. After that period expires, a new ticket must be bought. Getting caught without a valid ticket, results in a fine for 750 DKK / ~100 euro.

If you are several persons travelling, it might be beneficial to buy a "rejsekort" (travelling card). Read about it: http://www.rejsekort.dk/?sc_lang=en



METRO:

When moving around in the inner part of Copenhagen, you also have the option of using the metro / subway system. The tickets are the same as for the trains or buses, and the same zone system applies (see below map). You'll be able to spot metro stations by looking for the sign shown to the right.





There are also bus lines, but there are too many routes to list here. Instead we recommend you to use the following website to plan your routes around Denmark. This website is available in English and German also: http://rejseplanen.dk/

CITY BIKES:

Another option of getting around Copenhagen in a Danish way is using the city bikes:

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The bikes are equipped with an electronically powered engine, which will help you ride the bike, if you're not used to it. Furthermore it has tablets on the handlebars, where you can get a map over the city and a list of sights to see.

If you already now know that you want to ride the bike, register at the website, as the bikes require login. Else you can register at the bikes.

We will be staying at the following place in Denmark.



We have rented a cabin where it will take you maximum half an hour to get to DTU where the teaching will happen. This means you should bring a sleeping bag and sheets. And pillows if that is what floats your boat.



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GETTING TO DENMARK AND THE CABIN

On the arrival day the 19th of July, you will have to find your way to the cabin where we stay. Don't worry, it's pretty straightforward as explained in the following:

BY CAR:

You can use the following Google map link to create a driving route: http://tinyurl.com/nv8ax46

Just click the blue icon in the middle of the map, and select "to here" in the pop-up.

BY PLANE:

There are several airports spread around Denmark, but the best one to use to get to Copenhagen is Kastrup/Copenhagen airport, located 25 km away from the city.

Kastrup / Copenhagen:

- Getting to the cabin

- When you get off the plane, follow the signs for the train/metro. You'll need to buy a 6 zone ticket, which can be bought at the ticket sale close to the stairs leading up to the metro, or down to the trains. The price is 72 DKK / ~ 9.6 euro. After you have bought the ticket, go in the same direction as before, the metro is located just after the ticket office in the same line. Even though it's called a metro, it is above ground level, so find the elevator, and go up one floor.
- The easiest way is to take the metro from the airport to the station: Nørreport The sign in the metro will show the next station (Danish: Næste station, Nørreport),
- When you arrive at Nørreport metro station, go towards the stairs that leads to the street level.
- o Find the bus called 150S going towards Kokkedal station, shown in the picture to the right.
- o Frequency of bus is 15-20 minutes, so even if you miss one another will come soon.
- If you arrive late in the evening (after 00.00) or very early in the morning, you will have to take the night bus 95N which also goes from Nørreport.
- Get off at the Nærum station bus stop. Ask the bus driver to notify you when the bus is there.

When you get to the bus stop at Nærum st, call Ulrich or Vijay on the numbers stated above, and we will come pick you up.



STAY LONGER IN DENMARK

During the summer course we will not have time to see all the things that Denmark has to offer (there's a lot). Since you're already planning on coming, you may want to extend your stay, and travel around a bit, either by yourself or with some of the new BEST friends you will make on the course. You should consider this before booking any tickets. If you have any specific desires regarding things you would like to see, or discos you prefer, you can always ask us.

We will not necessarily be capable of hosting you before or after the course is taking place, so you will have to find your own accommodation.

INTERNATIONAL EVENING

This course is not just about learning about insider threats. It is also very much about getting to know other cultures and meet fellow technical students, who share the same desire to meet new people, as you do.

To make this happen, we have set off a whole afternoon and evening to make what is known in BEST as an **International Evening**. This will take place on Tuesday the 22nd of July.

In an international evening, every participant will introduce something, which represents his or her country. It can be some form of traditional food or sweets and traditional drink.

At the place of the international evening, you will have access to ovens and stoves, but as we have 26 participants, please think about how much you can prepare before you come to Denmark. ©

As the international evening is on Tuesday the 22nd of July, you probably shouldn't bring fresh meat and other things that can get bad in the meantime. We will have a limited space for food in our fridge for your food.

There might be one or two people from the same country as you, or neighbouring countries, or just countries which share some traditional things. Therefore it is a good idea to get to know those coordinate what to bring.

Each country will be given a place (most likely a small table) which they can decorate with their flag(s), food and drinks.

There's also a tradition that people wear traditional clothes from their country (you will not be forced, but it would add a lot to the atmosphere). Also, it would be nice if you could sing a small song in your language[©].

If you need inspiration of what to bring, sing or wear, then you can contact your local BEST group and ask them for advice.

LEARNING DANISH

Danish is very difficult to pronounce. We have those weird letters: \mathcal{A} \mathcal{O} \mathring{A} , of which the two last are actually also words in themselves.

Danes are often told that they have a potato in their mouth while speaking, so when you practise the sentences below, you might try it with a potato in your mouth ... or something the same size.

WHAT TO BRING / PACK

We know that all of you can pack your suitcase[®], but still just for reminder.

- Cell phone (So either your family or the organisers can get in touch with you, or if you need to make an emergency call).
- This survival guide

- Medicine (if you need any)
- Money (Danish currency only some shops accept euros, see above)
- Towel
- A bed sheet
- A pillow
- Sleeping bag
- Toothbrush and other toilet accessories (shavers, shampoo etc)
- Food / drinks for the international evening
- A flag representing your country (it can be a big flag, or small paper flags used at the international evening)
- Clothes (including warm clothes)
- Swimsuit
- Sun lotion
- Raincoat or a jacket that at least can repel water.
- Study materials: pencils, pens, paper and a calculator
- Backpack for going around Copenhagen

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
- Semi-formal clothes for the farewell party
- Costume for costume party, which will be announced on the mailing list/facebook
